# Did you hide from Rough Pitty Side?

Even if you start organising an event well in advance you always seem to get caught out when it suddenely appears in front of you in the calender. This literally happened with Hough Pitty Side for me as it was brought forward a month due to various reasons. (Robin Wood being cancelled and our shooting tenant, finding that we left the path, didn't want us to disturb the birds in April).

Organisng on a new area is always difficult as you can't gaurantee youve got all the landowners (Kind, we're still finding new ones in Sydnope). Tony Berwick had made a good job of initially contacting the landowners which made my job easier. I only had one problem wher I mis-interpreted Tony's map of landowners and thought one landowner only owned the car-park; he also owned much of the open! Luckily the access was no problem. Our only outstanding problem is one area which we're not too sure who owns it. The last known owner moved away 6 years ago. Wales thought one local, so Tony phoned all the people of that name in Wales — no luck, Devon said another, out came the phone again but no luck. Anyway the bit is fairly little used by the look of it!

Having got permission, advertised it as much as possible locally I sat back and waited, I contacted people late on due to Cromford being only 2 weeks before and Inter-Varsity the week before. A few days before I thought I might be short of he helpers but as usual DWO rallied round, and if anything I ended up a little over-manned. Thank you to all who helped.

The day before I went up with Tony to look at the area and tape off the mine-shafts. I hadn't really appreciated the true variation in the area until I got there. The beautiful rumnable flat floor of the valley contrasted with the steep tough hillsides. The mineshafts were something else. Ihadn't realised that people left open shafts with no markings on in the woodland. Don't organise night events on Rough Pitty Side. I put lots of tape round the open shafts which hopefully stopped people getting too near them - they do look bottomless. I also put out signs to the event, taped place for the finish, taped start lines and brashed master maps area (Sorry Tony, could you add a new clearing to the map!) Then home for a bad nights sleep.

Sunday. Hough Pitty Side is on high ground. The higher you go the colder it gets. Yes at 6.00am we have snow. Just a slight covering but enough to put many people off. (Some have told me so since.) The cold wind could easily have gone through me but with around 5 layers of clothing on, ( a must for all cold weather organisers) I stayed warm. Helpers arrived. Registration , finish tent, start organised, clocks synchronised and finish numbers at finish - no! where are they? Search. Find them - in finish gear! Panic over. The event proceeds. People begin to finish. Planner, Graham Johnson, waits around the finish ( a brave man) . Nobody can lynch him, they're all too tired. Comments soon come back. It was tough but fun. Every thing runs well. I begin to relax. After 12.30 I even have time to walk out and pick up road signs. Go and tidy up car park field. Seems OK. Then back to the finish. Find most of them have disappeared into the forest to help a collapsed competitor. However one man finish team, John Hurley, survivés. Roy Mason has helped competitor to within short distance of finish. The others sort out masses of clothing for competitor. Ian Whitehead finishes to find he has nothing to wear. Oh well! organisers clothing does come in useful. 2 back seats disappear into the forest and the LWO stretcher party emerge with competitor. John Hurley asks if he's retired as he passes the finish text! One thing I learns from the event. Don't give exposure cases hot drinks, from our resident murse Val Johnson. Tim Dallas' emergency blanket also proved useful. Shouldn't we have one (or two) in DVO's First Aid kit? Should we even have some small collapsible stretcher? Another thing came to mind at the time was the fact that I didn't know the position of the nearest phone box or hospital. Would it be useful to have this information in the file for each area? Luckily the emergency was successfully overcome. Thanks to all involved, especially key who stayed with the competitor for thour in the first place.

The event proved tough but INO proved we had the people to match the area, especially on the Brown course where we took the first 7 places. It was a shame not more people turned up for the new area. Well at least it will still be new next year.

#### BUDBY

Budby is large, flat and mostly very runnable, a complete contrast to the area the following week, Rough Pittyside. Yet it is one of the best things in our sport that these two events, so different, took place only seven days apart. From the outsiders viewpoint Budby rolled along very smoothly apart from the hio-cough in the results where 20 raffle tickets were missing, meaning that some people got times 20 places out. This was sorted out later.

The event itself was much as expected. The area being very flat almost didn't need contours (Ask Dave Brodie - he didn't even have brown on his map, and didn't notice till later;). It was an event for the runners and looking at the results we seem to have a few. Budby may not be a brilliant Lake District type area but it

still allows good orienteering to win.

My own course, M21A, was really a matter of keeping going and not making a mistake as any slight one could lose you a lot of places. All went well till 2/3 of the way round when I caught John Hopper up. Now I'd rather go off after someone than before but often in catching someone up I try too hard to get away and lose concentration. I seemed to make too many mistakes trying to keep ahead of John than I had done earlier. Never mind, it at least allowed us a bit of a race round and we both got quite fast times.

April 29th NOC Little John Open Helays. Bramcote Park
