COMPASS SPORT CUP RULES FOR 1988; MAIN COMPETITION - extract

Eligibility Wo runner may represent more than one club during the competition. Juniors who are members of groups attached to clubs small be eligible to represent the host club. Local members of clubs may compete for their club in any event selected for a cup match.

#### Teams

There is no limit to the number of runners a club may field, unless the eventorganiser is forced to restrict numbers due to land usage constraints. If restrictions are made, they should still permit up to ten competitors per team. No runner may run competitively more than once per match. To score, runners must compete in a team appropriate to their age category as follows:- Team A (Brown 1) M21

Team B (Brown 2) M17 M19 M35 M40

Team C (Blue) V19 W21 M45 M50

Team D (Red) | N13 | N15 | V17

Team E (Green) M55 M60 M65 V35 V40 W45 V50 V55 V60 V65 (At least

one counter to be 50+)

Team F (Orange) M10 M11 V10 V11 V13

Any competitor may "run up" a class or classes. Non M21's representing Team A must endorse their control cards as such or they will be treated as representing Team B.

#### Scoring

Points will be awarded to the best three finishers from each club in each team. In two club matches points will be awarded 6-5-4-3-2-1. In the Final (5 clubs) 15-14-13-etc, with the obvious adjustment for more and less in the final.

if there are more than two clubs participating in an event other than the final the scoring shal be done on the basis that two or more club matches had taken place successively but the same results were used. Eg A v B and then (winner of A v B) v C, rather than A v B v C.

The club with the highest total points from all six teams will be the winner. In the event of a tie the club with the most course victories the most seconds etc. If the match is still not resolved the lowest aggregate time of scoring team members will win.

In the event of a course, or courses, being declared void by the event controller, then the result of the match will be decided solely on the courses not voided

EVENT REPORTS

#### BROCTON AND MILFORD December 5th 1987

A bitterly cold day but a highly enjoyable event. Brocton and Milford is on the north edge of the Cannock Chase set of areas, and is a well-contoured and reasonably complex map. Much of it is open or semi-open, in other words, heather or bracken underfoot, and the eastern half is characterised by many re-entrants, which are tiring to cross.

Following on from Clipstone the previous week, the route choice seemed quite tricky, although the choice was generally restricted to straight, but up and down a lot, or round on paths. Consequently, unless you'd had three Shredded Whear for breakfast, there was quite a lot of path running. this would have been an excellent opportunity for a brown-only course, forcing one to keep in contact with the contours, and really test out technique. One leg was particularly good - of the people I spoke to, 4 distinct route choices had been taken, and they all claimed theirs was the best!

Afterwards, the results were a little slow in appearing on the line, so Steve Buckley and myself went into the results tent to enquire. The next thing we knew was that we were busy, staplers in hand, fixing up stubbs as fast as we could. Now that's a good idea! Perhaps DVO could try a little bit of persuasion on our customers to help at events - something like every 50th finisher has to take in controls might be interesting!


- Start 1 It was quite an easy leg. I thought I would go along a fence but instead 1 went along a path and into the depression when the path ended



Thanks to John Manning for the following article in which he describes how he is introducing his pupils to the delights of orienteering.

### ORIENTEERING AT SCHOOL

Gosforth School at Dronfield Woodhouse has made orienteering part of the school timetable.

Pupils at the school experience a variety of sports and leisure activities as part of their Physical Education. Football, hockey, gymnastics, dance, health related fitness, athletics, tennis, badminton, cricket are some of the courses on offer depending on the time of year and the availability of coaches.

Orienteering has been taught at the school in the past, but the most exciting part of this latest move to introduce pupils to a wider range of leisure pursuits is the enthusiasm of the pupils doing the course.

Approximately 15% of the pupils at the school have had some experience of orienteering with organisations like scouts and guides or with their parents. Now, over a 6 week course, the pupils learn how to read maps, plan routes, pavigate using a compass and judge distance travelled.

The weather this year has provided interesting variations like orienteering in the snow, mud-bath orienteering (something we all enjoy) and orienteering in the rain.

The map is a revision of the 1/1250 Ordnance Survey which was redrawn and reduced. The course is permanent and consists of over 250 control points which are identified by a three part code. The first two letters of the code are given on the master map, the third part is to be found when the control is visited. The control points are splodges of white paint on feace posts, buildings, walls, steps etc. and the codes written in a broad tip permanent feit pen.

Clour coded courses Red, Orange, Yellow and White are run to allow competition at different levels, with course records established and certificate times gained.


Compass experience is rather difficult to achieve on the school playing fields without waiting for dense fog so the maps were printed with only the control points - no details.

Some of the pupils have entered SYO events and plan to try their luck with DVO. Be warned.

Wational Event II 20th March 1988 Mulgrave Woods

Has anybody got all the mud off their shoes yet??

As you may have gathered from the above this event was just a little muddy. In fact even before I reached the start I had cleaned my shoes twice of mud. However despite this and my lowly position the event was very enjoyable. Two of the main reasons for this were the venue and the weather, being by the seaside with sunshine always makes things better.

The area itself was mainly runnable but unfortunately very steep with two rivers on either side of a steep ridge. The rivers were very cold and deep up to thigh depth in places, luckily only the longer courses were expected to cross the rivers without the aid of a bridge. As a result of the steepness of the terrain courses were generally short, not often does M21E have less than 10 kilometres.

The courses seemed very well planned but as a result of the mud route selection was normally straight. Whilst a path run may in theory have been the best route quite often the mud made the path very difficult running. One interesting feature on the map I used on the course was a tunnel which went through the ridge. It saved me about 10 metres of climb.
