







COMPETITION

In reply to Tony Berwick's plea for help in defining some words from his tattered remains of an early 'Glossary of Orienteering Terms' David Godfree has, after many hours of investigative work, found the following definitions:

- THATEF. The se not, as popularly believed, a disquesting area near Chesterfield. It is in fact a measurement of area hasod upon the acre. It came into use hecause of oddly shaped forests and to dodge BOF levies which were based on the area in which the forest was enclosed.
- GIRPLING: Girpling is crawling about in thick bushes. It comes from the story of a blind monk crawling around looking for his girdle.
- REVANTING: Junging over brashings. "Last Sunday was all revanting on the longer your legs the better." (Newstrack 1)

- SPRUNNEL: An early form of orienteering compass using a lode-stone as a needle. "The sprunnel is a wonder of modern technology, allowing accurate navigation. (Encyclopaedia Britannica 1960)
- SCRADD: This is a type of flee that lives in brambles. Its discovery in 1958 resulted in full body cover being introduced. "O" suits were designed to kill off the scrads.
- SNITTLING-LINE: This was the early name given to the straight line route. This is because the OS maps showed very little detail so anyone who went straight was considered mad.
- KIMBERLEY: This is orienteering very slowly. It is helieved to have come from a well known DVD member who it is said orienteers this way.
 - GROPPLY: Gropply orienteering involves following the fastest person you can find. Gropplers don't tend to be very good orienteers as they often follow someone on a different course, to themselves.
 - TIE: This describes very fast running. The origin is obscure but I may have screening to do with Sir Frank Whittle, designer of the jet ecgine.

WHAT A DISASTER!! It is difficult to be accurate, but I must have lost at least 15 minutes on one checkpoint (No. 7). How can you lose that much time on one checkpoint, especially at Stanton Moor? Well it's actually very easy - especially if you do the same as Mrs. Johnson and copy a control down wrong. This is the first time since I joined DVO that I have done this (4 years). I've turned up at the wrong place for an an event, I've turned up at cancelled events, I've turned up on the wrong day for an event and I've even run off with the wrong map twice at the same event (M21B map for 5 minutes returning to pick up M21A1 and completing the course in an excellent time only to find out that I should have run M21A2). However, to get back to Stanton Moor - No. 7, was he in the Prisoner?, was between two knolls', unfortunately there was another two knolls 50 metres NW of the real control site and on the other side of a major path and across a fence. I spent a good 10 minutes trying to find the b*18% (Translation - 'nice') control before making the grand decision that someone had 'half-inched' Just after I had arrived on the scene a fellow orienteer appeared looking for the same control and he too thought that it had been pinched (fool). The fact that no other competitors appeared while we were frantically running about like 2 lost sheep, made no difference to my conclusion, it never occured to me that I had copied it down incorrectly.

I decided to continue with my run, knowing that there was more at stake than just Brown Course victory - there was the east Midlands Knockout and even although I had lost 10 minutes - the competition, Dave Brodie, was old and past it and wouldn't get anywhere near me, even with this 10 minute advantage. (assuming that the event wasn't cancelled due to a lost control)

However, at the second master maps I was informed by everyone that the control was indeed in the correct position and last seen only 10 minutes ago. Knowing that I had blown it I was then faced with retiring or carrying on to complete the course. I noticed that the route from 13 to 14 would pass by No. 7 again and so I decided to carry on and attempt to pick it up after 13 (well aware that I would be disqualified for this - such an honest chap). However, still not aware that I had copied it down incorrectly I spent a further 5 minutes after 13 looking for No. 7 again.

I eventually gave up and plodded round the rest of the course completely baffled as to why I couldn't find No. 7. Later on while on my way from 18 to 19 I met Steve Kerr of NOC on his way to No. 7 - I warned him about it and told him to take it easy as he got near the control site. As I watched him I noticed that he was making no attempt to go down to the fence and cross it - this made me look at my map to see what route choice he was taking and then IT DAWNED ON MBI - WHAT A WALLY! I ran with to where I thought No. 7 might be and sure enough there it was sticking p with a huge smile on it's face - I gave it a good kick (sorry John). I know how that I had blown the Bast Midlands Knockout, even old father time could have beaten me after wasting all this time. However the fun was not all over Paul Gebbett caught me at 25 but had to slow down in the tricky northern part of the map. He eventually pulled away leaving No. 26 but mistook the path below the ridge for the large crag and ran off at 90 degrees, I quickly dived down to the path and up the ridge to the checkpoint, stamped the control card and climbed out just in time to see Paul come over the ridge looking for No. 27. I moved my head from side to side as if looking for the control and gently plodded off towards the last checkpoint. He followed me in and stamped it and ran off for the finish.

Now, here's one for Scroples, what would you do? Mell, I shouted him back and told him that he had missed out the second last checkpoint, he took some convincing but he was soon running back to find No. 27.

What a day! Congratulations to Dave Brodie on getting through to the final of the East Midlands Knockout. (don't let it go to your head Dave, that's the last time D. Brodie will be above A. Campbell in the results - until the next time!)

The string course proved to be very popular with the grown-ups! I think the fastest time was recorded by Paul Gebbet somewhere in the region of 2 minutes 10 seconds, although a report has just come in saying that David Godfree won the King of the String title. Your correspondent is making no predictions about the results!



Unfortunately I don't have any results for this event but I'm not too keen to see them anyway. It was a freezing cold and very wet and windy day. The orienteering was as easy as expected but everyone was held back by the icy cold wind and wet underfoot.

This included two events, the British Nights Championships on the Saturday Night followed by a badge event on the Sunday.

Chugaboom was left behind, the Campbells were going to live it up this weekend. We stayed the night at the village Inn about 5 minutes from Swallowvallets the area for the British Nights. I left Catherine and the kids tucking into a hearty meal in the cosy restaurant at the Inn while I set off for my run in the dark at Swallowvallets.

This being my first night event of the season I was a wee bit apprehensive. I decided to invest in a new 'lighting' system but was disappointed in the value for money in the new twin lamped head-torch. Perhaps Halogen bulbs will improve it. It was of no use on the way to the first control, I ran right across the path cross-roads without noticing, and because it was a downhill run it wasn't until I had gone a fair bit passed that I realised what I had done. I ran back up the hill, relocated and ran into the control.

A minute lost on the first control, not a good start, however I think it probably ended up helping me as it got the adrenalin going and I ended up with an excellent run, making only about 3-4 minutes of mistakes.

The planner's comments on the event included: "I tried to ensure that you had to concentrate and use appropriate night techniques". What are night techniques? I think the secret to my success, 3rd, was to use the same techniques as I use during the day i.e. run as hard as possible, which is quite slow compared to many, and as straight as possible.

I think I should stick to Night-O as obviously our Elite runners are slowing down to my pace in the Night in case they twist an ankle or lose contact with the map. Being the idiot that I am I run just as fast through the forest at night as I do in the day!

Night Orienteering is very much a low-key affair: to put my 3rd place in perspective there were only 39 competitors in the M21 Championship, a great deal less than you would expect at the British Individual (Day) Championships. However, it's still a nice feeling, especially when asked by the planner for a copy of my route.

On that night there were only two idiots from DVO, the other being our Night Supreme-O Tony Berwick who was 15th in the M50 class.

No. 1 caused a problem, is this a stream or not a stream? Well, could be mine down there, but it does seem low. It's not, never mind, only one minute or so lost. The stream must be further on. Put the dither behind and run. Straight to the holly bush.

On to No. 2, running well, now this one must be easier. What are all these bushes doing? They seem to have multiplied since the map was made. Lots of people about, running from behind all the bushes (I was one of them - Ed.) no help there, the map however did provide help. The trees were marked. Maps infact often offer quite a lot of help.

Set off for No. 3, made a mistake here, if I'd gone left and not right the brambles would have been avoided. Made a detour via a niche. Ah! that's mine down there. So far 3 minutes lost, not too bad but must keep going.

No. 4 was better but did hesitate passing an un-marked wall (is this the missing wall referred to in Kim's report - Ed.) just before the correct one, but should have noticed the stream just beyond. Again close reference to the map helped when I remembered to consult it.

Off to No. 5, excellent navigation but where are these gateposts on the map. There's a control, must be on the map, perhaps there's a path. No path. Don't understand. Land a bit vague. Ah! here's the stream, there's the wall, what's that open doing and where are the boulders? Brain very now. Eventually it dawned, I did get a wet foot by those gateposts. Were they the boulders? Retraced steps, accumulative total lost 9 minutes.

Managed 6 but 7 did seem a long slog. Tried a vegetation boundary and stream hopefully on the way. I expect NOT many managed to misplace a road including crossing point and drinks control.

On to the moor: 8, 9 and 10 caused no problems, even 11 only got misplaced because I followed everyone else into a large depression instead of consulting the map to find I was looking for a SPUR.

Only lose height if you need to, so looked for the way round the top of the deep re-entrant which separated me from the rest of the course. Wasted another minute and finally made the descent and then the ascent. Navigated to 12 without incident. Saving height loss now imprinted on my brain I stayed up high in the bracken, brambles, tussock grass and marsh. Eventually had to drop onto the road just the same as everyone else except I had lost another minute.

I cut off far too early for 13 and struggled through man-eating brambles. I could see a control far below in a ditch, must have been a fantasy though as I came upon the same ditch with another control in it.

By now the brain had really packed in and couldn't sort out anything. Eventually Tony Berwick came to the rescue with the enlarged edition of the map. Another struggle through the brambles.

13 to 14 to 15 were really good legs. I ran confidently and accurately. I must have decided that I'd lost quite enough time. Total loss was approximately 20 mins. NOT THE WAY TO TRY AND WIN THE BRITISH!

NEW BADGE SCHEME

Proposed changes to the Badge Scheme

BOF are intending to "improve" the badge scheme. The outline of the proposals is as follows.

- 1. The A and B courses will be replaced by new long and short courses.
- The length of the long course will be about the same as the present A course.
- The short course will be about two thirds of the length of the long course and will be technically the same.
- 4. The C courses will be discontinued.
- Badge times will be calculated for both courses from the winning times of the long course as a kilometre rate.

& gold standard will be attainable on the short course (could this encourage under running)

Whether this means that the short/B course is no longer a "soft option" (some hope!) for the silver standard will have to be seen.

Please make your views on these proposals known so that I may pass on the opinion of the club via the ELCA.


Proposed changes to Compass Sport Cup

BOF NATIONAL MAPPING CONFERENCE

In EMEWS 119 there is an article on the BOF Mapping Conference at Lea Green in December. Courtesy of Mike Godfree I have printed below the output from the conference. If anyone would like to see a copy of the original then please give me a ring and I will bring it to the next training run or 'O' meeting.



EQUIPMENT

The following article is a reprint of an article printed in a back issue of Newstrack in 1988. John thought that we might like a little reminder as to how to use the system (I think it's mainly aimed at me!!)

CONTROLS are easily carried to control sites in plastic carrier bags. Hang them on a handy tree or use one of the prepared canes and hang over the attached paper clip. (or take a spare tree with you)

PUNCHES are attached in pairs to cames. Plastic spiral strips hold the strings tightly to the cames to avoid tangling whilst in transit. Punch cames should be angled into the ground to avoid punches tangling during the event. Release the strings from the spiral binding.

Carrying bundles of cames is best done with rubber bands securing the two ends of the bundles sothat cames can be released singly without disturbing the rest of the bundle.

It is more likely that you will be involved in collecting in controls rather than putting them out. Collection is the reverse of putting out.

Ens: that the punches are well secured to the cane with the spiral bind so that the string is taut. Bundle the canes by securing with rubbe cands (ask the planner for some before you go collecting). Take control off canes and carry in a plastic carrier bag (preferably Harods). If y the controls and punches in this way then you will return to the planner with two or three neat bundles ready for passing on to the next planner than bringing back a massive tangle of punches, string, controls, canes and paper clips.
