Ten years ago......

This October sees a National Event being held at Pembrey, South Wales. This is a very fast but technical area being mainly forested sand dunes. However this is reputed to be the last time for orienteering as the area is being felled so enjoy it while you can. I thought it would be interesting to look at the results for when Pembrey was first used back in 1980 and see how DVO fared then.

M21A seems to have most DVO members with Steve Buckley coming sixth. Mike Gardner was best of the younger M21s followed by Steve Kimberley, Ian Whitehead, and past member Hugh Roberts (now with MDXXO). There are a couple of other familiar names. Mick Lucking was beaten by all DVO members as was Pete Jones then of ABER who was well down. Another future DVO member was in M21E, who else but Dave Nevell who came 14th on that course.

On the women's premier course we only had one competitor Judy Buckiey, who came 19th in W19E. In all not so many women seemed to have made the journey down. Deborah Wilkinson came 4th on W3SA and Jenny Tennant was 14th on W43. The only other female member I can find is Kath Yellowiey (later Whitehead) who retired on W19B.

On the other gents courses Roger Wilkinson was third on M35 and Andy Clayton 25th on M21B. The only other DVO member I can find in the results is Ewan Thomson who came 9th on his course running for his club then, Wimbourne, Which class? - M11!

Using mainly local results this article could form the basis of a series though it really has to be a long standing member who has kept their results. Any volunteers?

I have enclosed a copy of the minutes from last years AGM & an Agenda for this years.

In response to Roz' request I have summarised the minutes from the last DVO committee meeting below.


1. A donation was sent to Colin Gray, our guest speaker at the last open meeting.

2. EH news:

- a) There will be 5 Schools League events which will be incorporated into ordinary colour coded events. (1 * DVO, 1 * LOG, 1 * LEI, 2 * NOC). The schools complained that Whitesprings was too hard (however the scouts liked it).
- b) We have nominated Whitesprings & Allestree for the EM Gallopen.
- c) John Hawkins and Dave Clough both attended a Controllers course.
- d) The 1991 levy will be 15% on the first £500 & 30% thereafter. Each day of a multi-day event will be treated separately.
- e) On the 8th/9th September there is a conference on Land Access & Conservation. The EMOA will subsidise the first applicant.
- f) J.K. finances have been approved. £14 minimum registration by mid-Jan, then it will rise steeply with no guarantee of places. ALL HELPERS MUST PAY. The aim is 5,000 people.
- g) Sponsorship: £43,000 from TSB for '91 (£8,500 for the JK). £3,000 from the daily Telegraph for Schools League. In '92 there will be no sponsorship for the JK - instead the money will go to a 25 year Jubilee of BOF.
- h) New controllers T.Berwick, B.Bibby & B.Day are now official.
- i) Grant applications from DVO to EM have all received 30%.
- j) EM AGM (& Fun & Games) is on the 9th October.

- 3. Fixtures: we still need volunteer organisers for some of our events.
- 4. Equipment: the club now possess a complete set of rechargeable batteries. No batteries should be bought!
- 5. Newstrack: Paul Wright to provide fixtures list.
- Development: 20-30 people have been attending the Friday night events and at least half of these are not our regular Wednesday night runners. We should definitely run this again.
- Secretary: Application from Mike Jubb for Malden Tour with British Junior Squad. EMOA are giving 30% and DVO will
 give £20. Compass Sport Cup to be discussed at AGM.
- 8. AGM: 2 amendments proposed local membership to follow same rules as BOF ie, running from January, and an election of a new committee post of CAPTAIN to organise Compass Sport Cup and Relays.
- AOB: A complaint has been made at how easy BOF give out names & addresses. Paul will raise this at the next EM
 meeting.
