Walesby October 20th

Over 500 people turned out on a bright sunny day to pit their wits against what must be called one of NOC's easier areas. Walesby for those of you who haven't been there is flat, runnable (generally) and devoid of any areas of great technical difficulty.

Last year DVO seemed to be dominating the East Midlands club events at least on the longer courses, but perhaps this year things are going to be much harder. Only on two courses, did DVD provide the winners both of whom are long standing members of the club. Paul Armstrong won the red course by a margin of nearly six minutes so proving that he's lost none of his speed. John Hurley didn't do quite as well, only winning by nearly five minutes on the blue. All blue competitors had to deal with the added complexity of fallen controls.

On the nine kilometre course, officially described as a training course, the top three were within thirty seconds of one another. This time DVO lost out with Steve Kimberley coming third. Three other members of DVO, Roger Wilkinson Andy Thomson and Dave Brodie were all in the top three. (Ed. are you sure?)

On the shorter courses few of DVO's members were highly placed against the generally much older competition. However most members seemed to enjoy their courses with Jamie Sircom and Kathryn Griffiths both competing on two courses. One last question though, what was Paul Seaston doing missing No.20 on the blue course? Does he always have problems at the end of his courses?

It is quite a challenge (specially if you like mist, rain and thickets in the dark).



Unless otherwise stated registration for events opens at 10.00 and start times are available at minute intervals from 10.30 to 12.30. Fees for colour-coded courses are one pound for seniors, 40 pence for juniors. Novices should try the lighter coloured courses first: white, yellow, orange, red. The green, blue and brown courses are designed for experienced orienteers, to be won in 50 to 60 minutes. If you complete a course quickly you can always try the next longest one.Do not wear too many clothes, you often get quite hot once you get going. On muddy days walking boots or shoes with a stud are recommended. You will need a red biro for copying down your course and a compass is essential for making sure your map is Northed.

- 1. To elect a chairman(not necessarily the club chairman) who will convene meetings as required and at a time and place convenient to sub-committee members (e.g. Wednesday evening) and who will chair the meetings.
- To elect a secretary who will report the recommendations of the sub-committee to the business meeting immediately following the sub-committee meeting.
- To meet four times a year possibly in March, June, September and December.
- 4. To recommend to a club business meeting venues and dates for all Open, Badge and National Events and other events as requested by club business meetings. Recommendations for Open, Badge and National Events to be made at least 12 months in advance.
