Thoughts from the Chair

I hope everyone enjoyed the Eyam Moor Badge event and many thanks to all those of you who helped before and on the day. Whilst this particular Badge event may not have made us much money, events such as these do depend on the support of as many club members as possible to make them work. Organisers often find it difficult to recruit enough helpers, so why not ring up and offer to take on a job at any of our future events. This will not stop you having a run, which you will be able to have at half price.

Fixtures Sub-Committee has arranged a full programme of local, colour-coded and badge events for the next year and Stuart Swalwell, the new Chair of the committee, is anxious to complete his list of organisers, planners and controllers. If you are worried about committing yourself for the first time, why not offer to assist a more experienced official before taking the lead yourself. That's how I started in organising and planning, and I have offered to assist in controlling the Whitesprings event next March to gain experience of that side of the sport.

We are also looking to put on more local events aimed at schools, the youth service and uniformed organisations, as well as developing the orienteering skills of our existing club members. Val Johnson is also organising coaching sessions prior to a number of events to help juniors and novices to develop their skills and then put them immediately into practice at the event. Val is also looking to organise some training sessions for all members in other areas such as Cannock Chase and the Lake District, using local expertise and knowledge, including regional coaches. The emphasis will be on improving techniques and then applying them.

And what about your fitness? Unfortunately, I was unable to get to the circuit training as Viv was first delayed by trains from Nottingham and then by snow on the moors above Matlock. I gather that everyone was worked very hard and there was still evidence of stiff limbs at Byrons Walk on the Sunday. Many thanks to James Allen for organising the session. We have discussed whether future sessions should be monthly or fortnightly. People are likely to gain most benefit from more regular training so we are going to organise it fortnightly and those that only wanting a monthly session need only go then. Watch out for details of the next evening!

There will be a number of important issues to be resolved next year, including the structure of BOF and the levies raised at events to fund BOF. Electronic punching is inevitably going to become more widespread. For DVO a major issue will be how we attract and retain new members, both juniors and adults, and how we encourage our membership to be more active. More lottery money is likely to be available but we will have to show that earlier funding has shown results. Perhaps some of you could use your own contacts in schools and other

To the hills at last, and a fair climb up to the start, last-minute tweaking of rucksack straps for that ultimate comfort feeling, then off. Hurrah! We chose a good running track to the first control avoiding the climb, and bagging more points as well. DUE WEST – James Allen's Adventures in Canada

Ten days after getting back from Norway, I was off again, this time with Janice for a week's holiday in Ontario Canada. Using the power of the Internet I had found that the Ontario Championships were taking place over the weekend that we were flying back home. It would be possible for us to run on the first day, but not the second. The organiser was more than happy for us to take part.

The event was held in the Northumberland Forest, about 20 miles north of Lake Ontario and about 90 minutes east of Toronto. Over the previous couple of days we'd been walking in Algonquin Provincial Park. Looking at the terrain there, I was expecting the Championships to be on terrain very Scandinavian in feel.

As it turned out, the terrain was very similar to that we might find at home. The forest was quite comparable to Cannock Chase, but with more contours and more natural growth. There was even a small area of sand dune in the middle of it. To say it was the beginning of October, the forest was very runnable. No bracken or brambles, and the poison ivy was dying back almost completely.

The event was on a much smaller scale than we would expect at home. I would liken the event to the Midlands Championships. There were approximately 150 competitors, and we were using very good inkjet printed maps. I have used these once before at a HALO badge event, and wasn't overly impressed, but this map was perfectly acceptable.

One unusual factor was the start boxes being about 200m long. You had to step over the line and run like crazy to make the next line in the minute. I started and collected my map and was pleased to see that there was nothing out there to cause any great problems. Naturally I went out and made a complete and

embarrassing hash of number one, involving a relocation off a road within earshot of the start. D'oh!

I settled down and ran cleanly through the other 15 controls. The course was a bit of a monster - 9.63km and 385m. A week of donuts and similarly healthy food was taking its toll by the end. The winner went around in 68 minutes. I didn't!

Afterwards, over a bowl of chilli every bit as good as Wilf's, I had a look at Day Two's map. It was green. All over. Completely green! Talking to the organiser, he explained that that was nothing. In Manitoba they have the following map key: white - fight, light green - fight some more, dark green - fights back! Our 68-minute man took 154 on Day Two. Perhaps it was fortunate I was flying home on Day 1. I might still be out there.

If you ever get the chance to run in Canada do so. The forests are big and more importantly the welcome is fantastic.

DVO PUBLICITY STRATEGY

Introduction

As you may know, the numbers participating in orienteering are falling in this country, particularly in the younger age groups. DVO membership is also going down. This is bad news for the future of the sport and disappointing just at the time when Britain has a Gold medal winner in the World Championships.

As your recently appointed Publicity Officer, I thought it would be helpful for the Club to have a Publicity Strategy, so that we can spend the next year trying to increase the membership of the club and the number of people at events. The Committee has discussed the strategy and it is printed below - both for comments and for volunteers to help with it.

We have a small team - Val Johnson works with the schools to encourage them; Dave Bennett had kindly agreed to do all the flyers for events and Steve Kimberley masterminds our website. Any other help would be very welcome.

1. Our Aims

- (a) Retain current members
- (b) Increase membership
- (c) Increase the number of people at events
- (d) Target young people
- (e) Target novice adults
- (f) Target students
- (g) Attract visitors to Derbyshire to take part
- (h) Target groups such as women, disabled people, black and ethnic minorities
- (i) Increase the number of groups affiliated to the club

2. Proposed courses of action

- (a) when BOF renewals data is available, send questionnaires to all members not renewing and ask why they have left the club - see what improvements can be made
- (b) at DVO events, anyone registering as DVO who is not helping, should be given a leaflet about the club and asked to help in the future - this will also be included in the club handbook
- (c) new members can be asked how they heard about the club

- (d) purchase a number of the BOF leaflets about orienteering and include a fixtures list for the following year. Send this out to schools, youth groups, doctors surgeries (could refer to the health benefits), hospitals, major employers for their notice boards (and possible payroll), special interest groups such as countryside and environmental groups, parent and toddler groups, libraries, Tourist Information Centres (TICs), sports and leisure centres, running clubs, outdoor shops, colleges, student unions, supermarket boards. In some of these places also put up a BOF poster with local contact address and telephone number.
- (e) put the details of each event on the Web. Before each event write a press release for the newspapers in the area of the event.
- (f) promote the summer evening events for novice adults and continue to put on a Light Green course; publicise through TICs, 'What's on' publications etc. This may also attract visitors in the area.
- (g) look at how to recruit local groups to DVO/BOF membership.
- (h) consider taking stalls at galas, medieval markets and offering to send speakers to organisations to talk about orienteering.
- (i) After an event include the results on the website, together with any interesting stories and do a similar follow-up in the local newspapers.

3. Need to

- set up databases of newspapers, radios, groups, and doctors' surgeries, schools, youth groups etc
- keep a record of all press coverage
- consider how we can help newcomers to the sport (transport, telling them about Wednesday training, regular coaching at all levels etc)

4. Performance indicators

- numbers retained
- new members
- numbers at events including where they heard about the event
- affiliated groups
