EVENT REPORTS

WESTERHAM CHART - 4th December 1994

Viv and I made our annual foray south in our attempt to be the highest DVO participants in an event - by being the only ones taking part! As a result friends of ours in Kent had their Christmas visit rather early in December.

We both ran the same course as I ran M40S and Viv W40L. At 5.7km with 160m of climb we thought we would be able to have a good run and then face the challenges of the M25, Dartford Tunnel and the M1.

The courses were quite pleasant, through runnable forest which, despite the extensive network of paths still provided some interesting route choices and control locations - but Viv may have a different view about that. (Ouch!)

Finishing in 70.03, I was surprised to see that, with most of the results up, the fastest time was 74.14 and went back to the car quite chuffed. When I went back again with Viv (who took 104.58 - go on, ask her about those interesting route choices and control locations) only to find out that one of the controls had disappeared early on and, despite it being replaced fairly quickly, the course was declared void. So I'll never know how I would have done and can only look wistfully at my first place in the results. Still, we had a good run and I bought some new socks from \$ Runners - my own variant of "coals to Newcastle".

RAWNSLEY HILLS - 1st January 1995

The trick with first-day-of-the year events is to make up your mind to go at least a week in advance, to tell everyone else you're going, make the sandwiches the day before, leave nothing to chance. If you leave it to the day itself, you'll never make it. The last thing you'll want to do is to drag yourself out of bed and face the demands not only of a thrash round the forest but also, of all events, a score event. I mean, it's bad enough, at the best of times, navigating round a course that someone else has kindly laid out for you, but making decisions like which control shall I go to first, should I go for the 30 pointers or see how I get on with the ten-pointers, is really too much for the brain to cope with when it is, shall we say, in a rather delicate condition following the overconsumption of the previous night.

Well, having taken the above advice, there really was nothing for it but to set off for Cannock Chase, the rest of the family about as eager as I was. I really did not feel up to this; my thoughts were churning as violently as my stomach. I

was resigned to a rather unstable hour's running, until a rather wizard wheeze penetrated the fog which was occupying the space where my brain used to be. Cannock is a very public place isn't it? I really could not contemplate letting an innocent 9-year old girl, well Kate anyway, loose on it unchaperoned, so I selflessly volunteered to accompany her round her course, thereby achieving the triple whammy of getting out of an experience I was anxious to avoid, appearing worthy and saintly in giving up my run and gaining valuable Brownie points next time one of us has to look after the kids ("well I had to give up my run at Cannock"). Neat, huh?

After Eyam Moor, my New Years resolution was going to be to try to be less quick to criticise the perceived short-comings of planners and organisers. This well-meaning determination did not survive one event. Sad to say, there were, I felt, three glaring shortcomings in this event:

1. No concessions to Juniors. This was a single score event open to all with no advance indication that it would not be suitable to, say, a reasonably competent orange competitor. It is quite possible to accommodate junior age classes in a score event; you just make sure the controls nearer the start are of a yellow or possibly orange standard - although by far the best solution is to have a separate competition altogether as DVO did the following day at Cromford. It was just as well that I did follow Kate around because apart from the odd control the physical and technical standard was 4 and 5. W13 and W11 Ruth and Hilary managed 6 controls in an hour, being quite capable of double this number of controls in a lesser time on orthodox courses.

2. Confusing Start Arrangements. For some reason, there was a "Pre-Start" area and a Start about 500 metres away down a track. About 200 orienteers crowded into the Pre-Start area. Those of us at the back struggled in vain to hear the unamplified instructions, and then it seemed that everyone was making their way to the Start so Kate and I followed them. Forgive my literal interpretation of English but I did expect the Start to start at the Start, but it didn't; it had already started at the Pre-Start, and it was only when we noticed people on the other side of the valley heading for one of first controls that we realised it. Now is it a well organised event when two of the competitors are five minutes into the event and don't even realise it? I think not.

3. Chaotic Finish Arrangements. There was the usual penalty system for each minute over the hour, which is fair enough. But there were 200 competitors, within the expected capacity of the event since this was the number of pre-printed maps. Now the aim of the exercise was for each of those 200 to finish as close as possible to 12 o'clock. It does not take too much imagination to imagine the potential for dissatisfaction and confusion if the finish arrangements are not designed to cope with this. The most basic requirement for a score finish is that there should be a means by which those

finishing 1 minute late should be segregated from those finishing 2 minutes late; even this was sadly lacking. We were a minute late but found ourselves docked 2 minutes worth of points, whilst the chap next to me suffered the same fate whilst having arrived, he swore, within the hour. He was last seen marching purposefully in search of the organiser. It really did not matter to us whether we were one or two minutes late but this was supposed to be a "TSB Trophy" event, which is apparently only open to West Midlands clubs, a point which escaped me in the pre-event info.

All this was very unfortunate because it is these features which have stuck in the memory rather than what should have been an enjoyable first run of the year, a rare treat, a score event on a badge event standard area.

Note to EMEWS Ed - I did think ten times before typing the above, but it didn't make any difference.

Post-Result Note - Having now received the results, I am pleased to see that the organising team has recognised and accepted most of the above faults. The problems with the finish times were due to a difference between start and finish timings and it is also admitted that there should have been a loud hailer system at the start and more helpers.

STRAWBERRY HILL (Part 2) - 22nd January 1995

Not a lot you can say about Strawberry Hill, so I shall take the opportunity to have a general moan about the dearth of coordination of events this January. After starting the year in the best possible way with two events in two days, we have had to wait a further three weekends for the next one and, lo and behold, there was a choice of not just two but three(!) events to attend within reasonable travelling distance of DVOLand - this one, Sutton Park and Grenoside. This does at least give me the chance to rehearse the tired old analogy appertaining to the habits of the omnibus: you wait for ages and then three come along at once. Surely someone should have noticed that mid-January was an orienteering desert of Gobic proportions, commandeered one of these weekends and cleaned up on event-starved orienteers from miles around. As it was, this event - a fund-raising event for the Junior Regional Squad - was probably under-subscribed.

The family Johnson has now evolved to a state where we are between us entering five of the seven or eight courses normally available, so I am in a good position to comment, favourably in this case, on the standard of planning. I did not find out who the planner was (post-event note: the very prompt results tell me that it was Steve Wright), but he/she is to be congratulated on the standard and consistency achieved. Brown is very difficult to get right on an area like this, not the most technical, although largely runnable. However most of my legs involved a choice between a longer path route or a more risky but straighter cross-forest trek. Whichever I chose I felt in retrospect that the other would have been better, but no doubt the reverse would have applied, had the alternative been chosen, if that makes sense.

This particular event will not go down in the Graham Johnson memoirs when they come to be written, or if it does, it will be for the wrong reason. I started off copying the wrong course down, so I started again, but this time for some reason got two control 17s down in different places and no control 20. This, on top of an error-strewn and downright frustrating run, led to an ignominious retiral. In hindsight again, I would have copied down the second part of the course in a different coloured biro: there were a group of four or five controls in one section of the map featuring at different points on this second-master-map-less course, which was a bit confusing to say the least.

DELAMERE FOREST - 29th January 1995

This was quite a journey, an hour and three quarters, but, for heavens sake, this was the only Badge event within a hundred miles in January and the first opportunity to try out my newly acquired status as elder statesman, well M40 anyway. Continuing the theme of my comments on Strawberry Hill, February is not much better than Jan - we still have to wait another four weeks before the next badge-event-within-reasonable-travelling-distance, but at least there is a reasonable choice of C4s on each weekend in between to keep the appetite whetted.

A consultation of the archives revealed that we had surprisingly made only one previous acquaintance with this area, at the 1981 British Night Champs in the days when we could work up enthusiasm for such events. As a result of this event, Val, for twelve glorious months, rejoiced in the title of W19 - yes, it was that long ago - British Night Champion; shame for the other two competitors. I recall that the planner was trying out a Swedish idea of having each control lit by a small lantern, which was very useful but seemed to defeat the point. I have never seen the innovation repeated.

Back to 1995. Perhaps it was the novelty of the new age class, but, after a dodgy start, I actually had a decent run, ending up eighth, but 29 secs outside gold - damn that Rob Pearson. However the shine of this achievement was taken off somewhat by the almost complete absence of other DVO M40s (compassion prevents me from revealing the fate of Tim Norris). Where were the rest of you? I mean, what is the point of having a wonderful run if there is no-one to gloat over ("So how long did you take then?"). True the similarly recently inveterated Ian Whitehead was there but he had decided to show off by coming fourth on the M35L course.

JOHN MUIR TRUST APPEAL

The John Muir Trust has reached agreement with Ian Anderson, Leader of the rock group Jethro Tull, to purchase the Strathaird Estate in Skye. The 15000 acre estate covers part of the famous Black Cuillin, including the "finest mountain in Skye", Blaven (3040 ft) as well as the Elgol Peninsula with its crofting communities and fine coastline.

The Trust is mounting a £1 million appeal to raise money for the purchase and management of Strathaird and is seeking to recruit a significant number of new members. The John Muir Trust, founded in 1983, is committed to practical action to protect and restore Britain's remaining wild places, for their own sake, for the wildlife that depends on them, for the benefit of local communities and for the enjoyment of future generations. The Trust already own three magnificent areas of wild land in Knoydart, on Skye and Sandwood Bay in Sutherland. Viv and I went to the latter after the last Scottish 6-day and, given that Scotland does not have any National Parks, we feel it is important that we help protect these wonderful places.

Many of you will have already seen the appeal leaflet. If not, it is either included with this Newstrack or is available from us at the white high-top VW camper van (E480UCL).

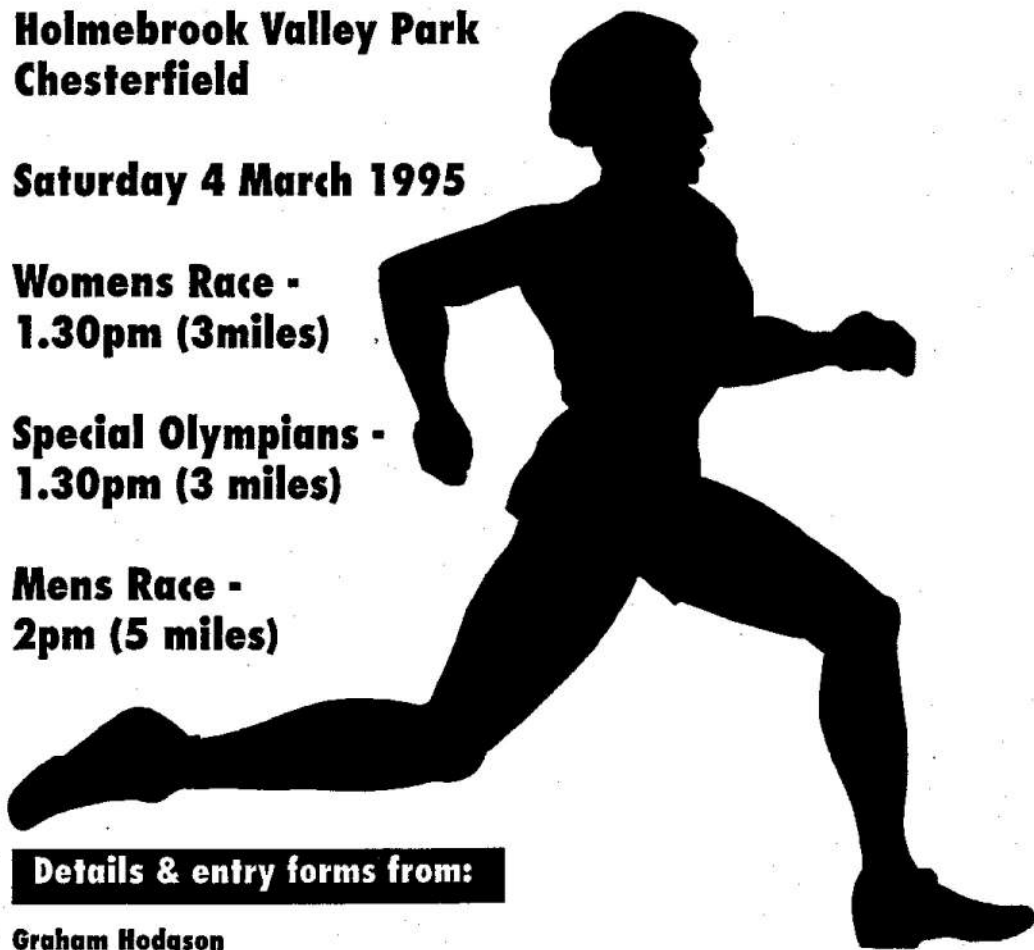

MIDSHIRES RELAY - 8th July 1995

You may have seen the new waymarked long distance path which has been given the name the Midshires Way". "The Midshires Way" is a long distance footpath and bridleway linking the Ridgeway National Trail in the South with the Trans-Pennine Trail in the North, a distance of 225 miles.

The route leaves the south of England by crossing over the River Trent at Long Eaton. The route then heads across the county in a north westerly direction via Duffield. The High Peak Trail and Buxton to Whaley (NT Ed - Paul spelt this "Whalley Bridge" - hmmm) Bridge where the footpath leaves the county.

It is DVO's intention to hold a 20 man/woman relay across the county using the Midshires route. There will a crack team which will set the record for this run. There will not be enough halls to go round. BUT fear not. As ours was one of the first to be received, we are near the top of the pile and details will be sent out shortly. MAPPING MATTERS

Maps are the life-blood of an orienteering club. No maps = no orienteering. If we are to continue as a vigorous club then as the club's mapping co-ordinator I need your help.

First an appeal to organisers and planners of past events. If you have any maps left over could you please return them, either to me or to the map cupboard. Even a handful can make the difference to holding a summer league event. The actual cost per map is not that much but the cost either in people's time or for professional survey is huge, we cannot afford to fritter them away.

Second an appeal to organisers and planners of future events. When you remove maps from the map cupboard please make sure you make an entry in the stock book which is kept in the cupboard and please return those unused promptly.

The club has made a considerable investment in OCAD software for drawing maps and a digitizer for computer input. We have now produced Allestree Park, Derby West Campus, Sinfin Moor Park and Calke Park maps as well as a number of school maps on the computer system, Cromford Moor is well on the way. We have also progressed to scanning the old maps into the computer. The real return on the investment however will come with the second edition of a computer drawn map when only the changes need to be input rather than a complete redraw. The ability to have computer drawn maps printed locally and to share costs by combining maps onto one A3 sheet has also reduced the cost per map.

This leads me to the third point. We are still in need of people at every stage of the process, but particularly to field check the computer drawing of the old map for changes. This does not need any highly sophisticated surveying skills, merely a basic orienteer's skill with compass and pace counting and an eye for detail.

The East Midlands Schools Development project has had relatively few applications from Derbyshire. If you know of a school which is keen on orienteering and would make use of a map of its grounds please get in touch with me in the first instance. If you would be prepared to draw the map we can provide assistance.
