Thoughts from the Chair

Well there's certainly plenty of orienteering around now after the dearth in the autumn.

The National Event at Ash Ranges on 3 January saw an interesting phenomenon (well I thought it was) in that no one from DVO won a class but we had 5 2nd places – Alex Whitehead (M10B), Steve Buckley (M50L), Jessica Whitehead (W10B), Judy Buckley (W50L) and Liz Smith (W55S). I was unable to run on the day but enjoyed walking round a bit of the area. Viv is still trying to work out why she mispunched the last control!

The Compass Sport Cup match on 10 January at Sherbrook South saw us pushed into third place by Walton Chasers and Bristol Orienteers. No doubt it will be written up elsewhere in Newstrack but an analysis of the distribution of points says a lot about the health of DVO at the moment. We are fairly strong in the men's and women's 35, 40, 45 and 50 but have a real gap in the older teenagers. With a number of good juniors coming through (congratulations to Matthew Dickinson on winning the M14) that may rectify itself in the future but we really do need to attract more young people into the club and keep more at the college/university age.

I enjoyed the Crich Chase event. Good parking, nice courses and excellent weather. Thanks to all concerned and I'm sorry to hear Barry is giving up planning as I think his courses were enjoyed by all.

The East Midlands Champs at Hopwas on 24 January was another enjoyable event, even though the walk to the start was a very tight 30 minutes for most of us. Again the weather was kind and hard standing made parking easy. No results as I write though you may know them by the time you read this.

With the Club's Score Event on New Years Day, that's 5 events in 4 weeks – surely no one can complain about this – even if they had any energy left to do so!

I'm going to use the privilege of this column to have a moan. Just before Christmas I planned the Colour Coded event at Bottom Moor and was rather disappointed by the turn out on the day. I knew that there was a Badge Event at Hope Woodlands, which was not really a problem as we could have done with the pressure being taken off our limited parking space. However, I was a bit annoyed to discover that one East Midlands club had organised their own Christmas event for that day and another was holding their Club Championships at Hope Woodlands. Luckily Chesterfield Scouts decided to turn up in numbers or some courses would have been severely depleted. The usual band of helpers performed their tasks admirably but it is a bit disheartening when so few competitors take part. Perhaps the East Midlands should look at encouraging clubs not to clash events in this way.

The East Midlands is acting as a trial area for a new method of allocating lottery grants for local groups — "Awards for all". Mike Godfree and Val Johnson attended a briefing meeting at the Sports Council in Nottingham and we have put together a bid for monies to support our development activities. As I mentioned in this column in the last Newstrack, and alluded to above, we need to put a lot of energy into attracting young people into the sport and keeping them here. This is partly about having qualified Coaches and Instructors, together with other helpers, but also mapping smaller local parks and school fields so that they can take part without travelling a long way. Our bid is to make appropriate payments and buy some additional equipment to meet these requirements. The next challenge, once we have got the youngsters involved, is to provide the transport to take them to other events. Whilst we may not get the money, at least we are putting further thought into how we can achieve some of the aims of our development plan and keep club membership buoyant.

A final morbid suggestion from Viv is that, given that a number of the club's senior males have heart conditions of various sorts, "we should have a mobile coronary care unit at the start, rather than the Red Cross, for the DVO dicky hearts group"! You see the sympathy I get!

I look forward to seeing many of you at the Club Dinner and no doubt embarrassing some of you with the annual awards.

Editorial Five-pennyworth. I gave Bottom Moor a miss for the Badge event at Hope Woodlands. DVO event or not, there was no contest between a local Badge event on a little-used, highly-runnable with extra never-before-used bit tagged-on area and a visit to the dentist's, sorry one of DVO's less runnable, featureless areas. The theory that you should try to organise several events at the same time to spread numbers needs to be judiciously applied because, unless care is exercised, the inevitable result is that the Ringo Starr event will suffer. The point is why did we have to have so many events on the same day when last autumn was the most abysmal orienteering season within living memory. Weeks passed with nothing worth hunting for a red biro for and then suddenly an event like Fairoak and Brindley appeared out of nowhere and half the orienteers in the country descended upon it like grannies at a Tom Jones concert, creating almost intolerable pressures on the organisation of what should have been a modest colour-coded event.

Now I know that the clash of fixtures on 4th December wasn't DVO's fault because we had our event registered long before MDOC came along with theirs. It would be easy to dismiss this conflict as an unfortunate coincidence and

insufficient evidence of a serious problem except that, lo and behold, what do we have on 21st February when DVO organises a colour-coded event at Whitesprings, but not one but two Badge event within reasonable travelling distance: the POTOC event at Trentham Gardens and the AIRE event at Bingley St Ives. Once again DVO's event will suffer not so much from lack of DVO support but from other clubs in the surrounding area. If you lived in Sheffield or Coventry, would you bother to travel to a Whitesprings colour-coded event rather than a badge event? I think not. There does seem to me to be more scope for discussion at a national level to ensure events like Bottom Moor get the support that the effort put into them deserves.

(Coincidentally, the problem is the subject of a item in the latest CompassSport highlighting the clash between National 3 at Bewick and the Cannock Chase Badge event on 7th March. "There has clearly been a breakdown of communication....this is a crazy situation and must not happen again" Sound familiar?)

Bethecar Moor - 29th November"

"It's bound to be raining - it's near Coniston". I stayed in Coniston for the Lakeland 5 Days event in August, since when any mention of the Lake District has conjured up an image of incessant rain and raging torrents. But that was Summer, Winter's different. The day of Lakeland OC's Badge Event at Bethecar Moor was beautifully clear and sunny. Bethecar Moor is high open moorland with lots of contour features which are separated by flatter areas of marsh. And as soon as you lose contact with the map, you realise it all looks exactly the same.

Unfortunately I didn't think of that at the start, and set off putting too much effort into the running. I was halfway round before I got the right balance between running and checking every contour. The event details had said that a lot of the measured climb could be avoided with careful route choice, but the finish was about 25 metres higher than the last control, yet less than 100 metres away from it. There is a fine distinction between slowing runners on the way into the finish and preventing them getting there at all.

Sitting on top of the hill at the finish, taking in the sun and the views of fells and Morecambe Bay, it was only the cold water in the marshes and the low angle of the sun which had betrayed the time of year.

Dave Walker tells me that Bethecar Moor was a bit of a culture shock when first mapped, as no-one had equated open moorland with fine navigation. For me, more used to orienteering in the Midlands, it was almost a (pleasant) culture shock to complete an event without once becoming entangled in brambles!

How often have you had one of those weekends when the world is determined to kick you when you are down?

Even though our sons have flown the nest, we still traipse the country in search of National Events. Forget about Ash Ranges (who wants results anyway?), National 2 should be good practice for J.K. Why travel down and back in one day when we can make a weekend of it?

Kick Number 1. Liz discovers that she has a compulsory Inset Day in Sheffield on the Saturday. Oh well, not so bad. There's a good rail link between Derby and Sheffield.

Kick Number 2. Except on Saturday, 6th February when Midlands Mainline have essential maintenance works between Derby and Chesterfield. Trains are diverted via Trent Junction; others go by 'bus' to Chesterfield! What's happening to Cross-country Virgin is a mystery to us all.

Plans are made and remade. Then, on Friday, comes Kick Number 3. 'Her' from the Council in Chesterfield (no, not Viv) informs me that the date so carefully selected for the School's event at Holmebrook Valley is......wait for it.......Cup Final Day! So what, you may ask? (Editor's note: this is believed to be a deliberately inflammatory question to which I shall, with great self-control and dignity, decline to respond).

While I'm conveying this piece of info to my nearest and dearest, Kick Number 4 arrives in the form of a neighbour – did I know we had a loose coping stone on the roof? After the strong winds of the night before we'd both checked the fence – a somewhat elderly and frail part of our domain – which had survived, but hadn't thought to raise our eyes to the heavens.

Saturday arrives – safely! Mike drops me at the station (early!) before embarking on the day's chores. Metro is poorly and needs putting on charge. Then out with the ladder and up on the roof. How can one ridge tile move so far? And the tile underneath it is cracked! We have no spares, nor do the Seastons. Marion manfully (should that be womanfully or personfully?) ('The A-Z of Non-Sexist Language' – no Chesterfield Borough Council employee should be without it - suggests 'courageously' – helpful editorial interjection) stands at the foot of the ladder while Mike does the necessary on the roof.

By the evening Metro is feeling better and enjoys the run down to the station to pick up Liz. Bags are packed, sandwiches are made and kit is laid out ready for an 8 am departure.

Kick Number 5 kicks in at 7.45 on Sunday morning. The car is loaded and we're off to National 2 – aren't we? Vectra coughs and groans. Start again! How do you disconnect the automatic choke? The handbook is less than helpful. There's only one answer – push! Those of you who have run from Rangemore Close have perhaps encountered the ever-so-slightly uphill drive on the curve. Talk about warming up before the event!

Taking great care to avoid the icy puddle in the turning circle, we push Vectra, hiccoughing and spluttering down the road - but to no avail. Eventually we reverse the procedure in the hope that Metro is up to a long trip. At this point, Number 28's curtains open and in a few minutes we have another pair of hands (feet destined for Shoal Hill) helping to push. Bags are transferred quickly from Vectra to Metro and by 8.20 we're on the road.

Luck is with us and we have a good trip south. What is on at the NEC? DVO car parking marshals are required - the tailback along the M40 is horrendous.

Parking for the National has been arranged in various car parks in Dorking town centre. After a quick bite to eat we set off in search of the main one which boasts 'heated' facilities as well as Ultasport, Compasspoint and Wilf's — we recognised the chocolate cake clutched in sticky paws on the High Street. The bussing is working efficiently (we queue for only a few minutes) and enjoy a pleasant 20 minute trip up on to the Downs. From drop-off point to Start is no more than five minutes walk.

General comments from early runners returning to the bus are favourable. Jenny Tennant comments on the "tablecloth" she's had to run with! Had it been a really windy day, we could have gone hang-gliding instead!

En route to the Start we pass not only Clothing Dump, Orange Squash and the Finish but also the uphill path to said Finish — this is proving to be a tough slog for many. Did we really want to know about it before we hit it?

The map when we pick it up is truly enormous (A2 for us oldies). Everyone seems to have problems with the faint overprint – where is the Start triangle? It takes a long time to work back from the first number which catches your eye. With several long legs, route choice becomes important. However some of the tracks are incredibly muddy, which

impedes progress and runnability is not always what it would seem - holly is damned prickly stuff!!

Pressure is not on me today. After recent 'faux pas' I've decided that this is just a silly little C4 event (albeit with a pre-marked map) to be got round as quickly as possible. I am quite pleased to meet at my first control she who set off 5 minutes ahead of me - the look I got is not repeatable! Apart from a hiccough at Number 2 and problems with a holly thicket later on, I have a good run. And the uphill finish is not nearly as bad as at Blacka Moor the previous week. The iron pills are still working!

It is pleasant sitting in the sun at the clothing dump chatting to other competitors. What a shame that the only results are DfY to be displayed in the main car park! It's at the Finish that you want them, not an hour later.

The long queues for the bus back to Dorking move quite quickly and we are soon back in our Council car park, changed and fed. We have a good trip home up the M1. Metro says she's enjoyed her trip out — the first real one since she'd been to Stansted for a week while someone went to the O'Ringen. Mike asks 'What's the name of the area we've just been to?" I don't know either. **

Kick Number 6 awaits us in Mickleover. Vectra still refuses to start. Mike's got to be at Crewe tomorrow morning to catch the 7.50 to Glasgow. Metro valiantly volunteers for duty again. Three days at Crewe – what fun!

Monday dawns. Snow falls silently. AA breakdown crew appears. Vectra is towed away – ignominiously.

The final kick – the Glasgow train is terminated at Carlisle and the journey is completed by coach!!

DVO JK ACCOMMODATION

During the Spring and Summer, DVO is as likely as the next club to find itself under canvass for multi-day events but in recent years it has become almost a tradition for the club to find a village hall for those without relatives to inflict themselves upon and who wish to take advantage of cheap floor space.
