Editor's Bit

I begin not unusually with an apology. The last Newstrack contained details of the Summer League but did not include either an indication of where the start for the events would be found or a contact number for the organiser. This is all very well for those who know roughly where, say, Drum Hill is but no use if you've just joined DVO or never been to an event before.

At the last business meeting the view was also expressed that the way that fixtures were presented in the last issue was confusing, with summer league events, general fixtures and the odd reference to summer training runs appearing in different sections. I did not get the impression that this criticism was a widely supported one but, nevertheless, Tony Seaston has done a splendid job in bringing together everything that is happening in DVOland to the end of the summer and beyond, and this is included in this issue as an easy-to-pull-out-and-stick-on-your-kitchen-wall-centrefold-spread, which should be enough to keep even cantankerous old windbags like Paul Wright happy (I can say what I like about him because, as he remarked as the last meeting, if you don't want anyone to find out about something, bury it in Newstrack).

I used to replicate a list of DVO officials' addresses and telephone numbers with Newstrack but stopped doing this as it seemed a bit pointless to continue to reproduce the same information every time, but I have put my name, address and telephone number on the front of this issue and will do the same in future so if anybody does have any queries in future they can ring me.

It may be my imagination but there do seem to have been fewer at the Summer League events this year, and this culminated in only 11 turning up at Crich Chase last Friday. Admittedly this was a foul evening but it doesn't alter the fact that it is easy to forget that Summer League events require tremendous organisation apart from the original inspiration, courses still have to be planned, areas recced, courses organisation than for colour-coded events, people tend to forget that the duties of both planner and organiser fall on the shoulders of one or two individuals who have to squeeze everything in on a Friday evening after work. The least people can do is to support these events.

I do not know whether people are put off by the novelty element to the events - although for me this is what enlivens what is often either a much used and over-familiar area or one with little to commend it from an orienteering point of view, Darley Park, for example, being a case in point - but they can just as easily be seen as an orienteering exercise in themselves, a convenient way to practise skills and take stock at a time of year when these opportunities are few and far between. You don't have to join in the competition.

I was tempted to think that the lack of numbers was due to the lack of information referred to above but a reading of Mike Godfree's comments on the Club Champs later on suggests that this may be too simple a view. The Club Champs attracted only 28 adults out of a club with over 120 BOF membership units including family members. It may be inappropriate for me to comment since I was one of the wedding-attenders who was unable to take part but it took an exceptional event like that to stop me. I echo Mike's bafflement at why so few took part in what should have been the centre-piece of the club's activities. Was it the fact that it took place unusually on a Saturday, or its northerly position? I don't know but I would have thought that members would have jumped at the chance to run on a completely new part of Longshaw representing some of the best terrain DVO possesses shortly before September's badge event. Anybody got any theories?

Hartington Petal Footpath Relay - 7th June

This was a superlative day organised by DVO - more particularly Ann Marie Priston ably assisted by Mike Godfree's computer know-how - and, despite the event having become established almost to a set formula over a number of years, Ann Marie's novel approach means that it is unlikely ever to follow the same format again. Her ideas were so simple that, in retrospect, it is surprising that no-one has thought of them before. Instead of having one continuous relay sprawling across the Peak District and returning to its origin only many hours later, the relay was split into "petals" comprising between one and six legs all starting and finishing at Hartington Youth Hostel. Whereas in previous years trying to follow progress, either as a spectator or simply to work out how long to wait for your run, meant trekking for miles, it was now simply a matter of standing at the hostel and, like a bus, one leg would come past sooner or later.

To this was added another innovation, that of having one petal start as soon as the first runner of the previous petal finished. Thus we had not one relay but a series of successive ones. To me this was the most imaginative reform. We were most fortunate to have the youth hostel to use as a base and even if, when the event is organised by other clubs in future years, they do not have this advantage, there is no reason why this part of the formula cannot be repeated again and again. You only have to look at the statistics to see how this added to the event both as a competition and a spectacle to appreciate the benefits - the 13th team finished 4hours and 7 minutes after the first but all 13 teams still started the 20th and last leg together. Clubs should be encouraged to enter as many teams as possible but it is inevitable that if one of the teams is to be the most competitive possible, the other will suffer in quality (speaking as a member

of Team 2!) and will lag behind Team 1 and probably the rest. The continual resetting of the watch kept this disparity to a minimum.

My leg was a case in point. It was Leg Number 15 - the second leg of two and stretching from Hollinsclough to the north west of Hartington back to the Hostel and at gone four in the afternoon I would probably have faced, under the old scheme, a lonely slog in a meaningless contest, but, as it was, my previous runner Neil Addison finished his leg sixth, literally seconds ahead of runners 7 and 8. Any thoughts of a casual jog back were immediately crushed as I prepared myself for a thrash up hill and down dale to maintain the position that Neil had sweated and fought for, against an Erewash RC member and William Hague look-alike John Hopper who had defected to Shelton Striders for the day. Normally a contest between me and John would be a no-contest but John was in an exceedingly generous mood. He overtook me on the first hill and as he disappeared into the distance I reconciled myself to not seeing him again until Hartington, so it came as a shock when a familiar voice regaled me from behind as I stopped to tie a shoe lace at a stile and John Hopper hove into view again, closely followed by Erewash-Runner, having contrived to lose his way in the meantime. I managed to keep John in sight until he chose to take a route around the sides of two fields which could be short-cut by a diagonal route and I found myself in the lead for a third time - still closely followed by Erewash-Runner who by this time had learned which one to follow. Thus it was that although John was able to overtake me again, the time between us was kept to 52 seconds and, although I beat Erewash-Runner, he clocked exactly the same time as I did. In fact this was not the only example of this phenomenon because Val also matched to the second the time of her NOC W35 arch-rival Janet Evans.

Having used Hartington as a base previously for walks, we had tended to wander south and the route between Hollinsclough was completely unknown to me. Having travelled the footpath a couple of times and recced the area around Val's route too, I would certainly recommend a return visit. The countryside is much less dramatic than the honey jars of Dovedale et all but there are ample compensations in the almost complete absence of other humans and the lushness of the constantly changing scenery.

Being based at the Youth Hostel and having the distraction of the local fete, everyone had less reason to hurry away at the end of the day. There was a good attendance at the prize giving - although never having attended one before, I'm not in a position to say whether this was more than normal - and the post-event barbecue which lasted until the sun was practically down also provided good reason to tarry, including for non-DVO members.

This was an event as near perfect as anyone could hope for and Holme Pierrepont RC whose turn it is to organise next year have a hard act to follow.
