# EVENT REPORTS

#### HIGHLAND 87

The wheel has now turned a full circle with the staging of the 6th Scottish 6-day event. The first 6 day event was in the Righlands and utilised the maps made for 1976 World Champs. Ten years on we made a return visit to some of the areas as well as to new areas.

The event centre was located in the village of Beauly some 15 miles beyond Inverness with campsite adjacent to the village.

Day 1 Creog Udlodail

Typical Scattish forest though not as rough as many. Ny memories of it from having explored it when camping next to it for two previous years were of little use except to confirm that there was only one forest road and one path. lack of concentration on my part gave an interesting 100m run from the finish to the last control and back again.

Day 2 Novar Rather green forest and easy moorland gave some interesting winning times - longer courses going across the moor were usually far faster than the shorter courses that had to traverse the forest. W40s were not very happy about this.

Day 3 Cawdor Return to the castle and its woods from 1977. An enlarged map produced a lot of path running and DVO with their late starts burnt around the area along the elephant track to produce some good results in contrast to our trail blazing effort of days 1 and 2.

Day 4 Instriach A long drive south to Avienore and the banks of the Spey took us to this area of moraine debris. My first glance at the map caused consternation when I saw the vast area of small ring contours and re-entrants. Unfortunately the area could be simplified by an exterior system of small rides which twisted through the hummocks. This did little to save many a lengthy outing.

Day 5 Achilty Worth A mainly moorland course on the North part of last

year's British Championship area.

Day 6 Achilty South The predominately bracken covered slopes were fortunately avoided by using the rather small wooded part of the map. This was an exciting climax to six days orienteering as the final points were calculated and poor results discarded.

No final result available but congratulations are due to Anna and Tom Clarke, Zoe Wilkinson, Steve Kimberley, Roger and (Tony? 3 people's efforts to decipher this name have failed!) for their valuable performances.

A throughly enjoyable week in generally dry and runnable forest, by Scottish standards.

### WORLD ORIENTEERING CHAMPIONSHIPS GERARDNER, FRANCE

The selection races took place on Wednesday. All eight British runners got through. The draw was held later the same day with entertainment by two actors from the Marcel Marceau school of mime. This was a good idea as the draw was quite long and boring.

The BIG DAY dawned fine and in fact we sat and roasted in the sun and felt sorry for people with late starts. As usual Sweden and Norway dominated the first ranks although the Swiss and Czechs were challenging.
